Roadside Cleanup Fall 2018

It's that time again. DLPOA members and anyone interested in helping clean up the roadsides around Deer Lake are encouraged to show up on Saturday, Sept. 22nd, at either of two designated places.

The first is the Fire Station on the east side of the lake. The other is at the intersection of Agar and North Deer Lake Rd. We meet at 8:00 a.m. Litter bags, pick-up tools, and safety vests are available at these locations.

Cleanup usually takes about 1 to 2 hours, then we meet at the Fire Station for hot dogs, coffee, or juice. It's a good time to enjoy some conversation with your neighbors.

Please leave full litter bags alongside the road and return the unused bags, pick-up tools, and vests to the original starting points. A designated driver will pick the bags up and take them to the dump. Do not take them there yourself.

If you are busy that day, but still would like to help, contact the coordinators to arrange to get supplies earlier. Any help is greatly appreciated.

We lost a valued member of our community with the passing of **Bill Bajadali** on May 25th. Bill was a DLPOA Board member from 2005—2014. He was involved with Dock Demolition, getting advertisers for the DLPOA calendar, the Fourth of July boat parade, the Pancake Feed, and more.

He made Deer Lake his second home, and was a good neighbor and friend to many. He will be missed.



Southwood Shores Road Update Mike Larson

In late spring, a coalition was formed between DLPOA, Stevens County Officials, and many residents along the road, to find a solution to the constant dust problem created by continuous traffic on the road.

A temporary and immediate solution was agreed upon. The county officials agreed to prepare the road and apply 4 inches of gravel with 'fines' at a cost of \$82,000. Interested residents agreed to hire LYMAN Dust Control to apply LINGO Road binder to further reduce dust at a cost of \$16,720 for the 2.2 miles covering Pine, Cedar, and Tamarack Bay areas. Money continues to be raised for this residential cost. So far, I have received 65 checks that total around \$10,000.

A permanent solution (probably chip seal) is currently being discussed. This includes applying for RAP Grant funding, and/or the possibility of forming a County Roads Improvement District.

Meanwhile, a DLPOA committee (Road Maintenance and Safety) has been formed to address similar issues concerning all parts of the lake.



Santora Winter Fish Report

We will receive about 15,000 fingerling Brook Trout this fall. We are again adding additional modifications to our net pen to keep our otter population (now at 6) at bay. We will be keeping tabs on our fish pen with a field, or live camera to make sure if there is a problem we can respond quickly. I'd like to thank my son, Kevin, and grandsons, Tony, Dustin, and Eric for their continued support to keep our net pen in great shape.

Deer Lake has an additional two net pens available for anyone interested in rearing fish throughout the winter. The Santora Family has been raising fish for the last 27 years and we see it as service work for the lake. We have had four generations of family working on this project and find it very rewarding. If you are interested in trying your hand at fish-rearing, we would be happy to guide you through the process. It is not a very time-consuming project once you understand the process.

River Otter facts:

River otters primarily eat fish. They are also known to eat whatever is easiest to find, like crustaceans, mollusks, insects, birds, oysters, shellfish, crabs, crayfish, frogs, rodents, turtles and aquatic invertebrates. (A local fisherman saw a large otter with a 5-7 pound largemouth bass in its mouth.)





River otters eat 15% to 20% of their total body weight each day. A large male may consume as **much** as 25 pounds of **food** daily.

Mating season: December to April.

Gestation: 60-63 days following delayed implantation.

Litter Size: 2-3 pups.

signs have been installed at the public launch, resorts and common launch point. We will probably have four more over the next couple of weeks.

DLPOA still has funding available for installing trail cams. To date, only 2 Associations/groups have participated. With winter coming, we are offering to assist you in helping to protect your neighborhood. Winter break-ins continue to be a problem. It is now the time to start thinking about how cabins will be secured for the winter.

The Sheriff's boat has been on the water twice this year. In addition, Sheriff wave runners have also been out visiting with boaters, skiers and jet skis.

Two new fire station construction projects have been completed. Preliminary reports indicate a response time reduction of 2.5 minutes so far. This will change some more over time. The stations are located in Suncrest and Loon Lake respectively. There will be some insurance changes. Some folks may get an increase, while most should see a reduction in their fire insurance. The stations are occupied 24 hours a day. Have your fire insurance agent call the District Office at 509-233-8876 as there are qualifiers that need to be applied.

The Wildland Inter-urban Interface program for reducing problems around the lake has not been well received at this time. To our knowledge, only four home/property owners have taken advantage of this program. Insurance companies are changing policies and/or cancelling fire insurance more often than not as the result of major wildland fires. Dock Demolition

We did not have a dock demolition in 2018. There were not enough docks to justify the expense and commitment. Shawn O'Neill will coordinate a possible Dock Demo Day in 2019, if needed. Contact him at shawn.f.oneill@gmail.com



The lake can raise 4 to 6 feet over the winter, lifting anchors from the lake bed. Now is the time to throw an extra rope on your dock. It can cost \$300 to have your dock towed and re-anchored. You could also cause some property damage to some of your neighbor's property on the lake. Better safe than sorry.

Invasive Milfoil May you legally "remove" it yourself?

The short answer is "yes," but you must follow the law and regulations on how to do so.

First, you need a permit. Why? Most bodies of water are the property of the State, held in trust for the public. This is also the case for fish and wildlife. For activities that alter or may alter the aquatic environment, potentially impacting fish and wildlife, you need a Hydraulic Project Approval (HPA) permit issued, in the case of removing aquatic weeds, by the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW).

Fortunately, obtaining the permit is easy. The permit itself is just a pamphlet issued by the WDFW for physical removal of invasive milfoil. Physical removal means "hand picking" of the entire plant with its roots, all in one piece. Milfoil spreads by fragmentation as well as by seeds. It is critical

that pieces of the plant remain intact during removal. So, even the use of "hand tools" is risky; and **digging and** raking should be avoided.

Although the "pamphlet permit," can cover removal by "mechanical" means, the risk of fragmentation is also high and should only be done by a qualified professional. Use of herbicides by the property owner is a "nono." Herbicide treatment can only be done by a professional with an "applicator license." The removed plants must be disposed of, far from the water.

The Pamphlet Permit is available for download at www.wdfw.wa.gov/ licensing/aquatic plant removal/ or at the WDFW's offices. The Pamphlet must be kept on-site when the removal is being done.

As always, PLEASE read the pamphlet before beginning removal, as well as "how to" information available on several internet sites. The pamphlet also strongly recommends a time to do removal under the permit.

Finally, it's useful to remember that invasive milfoil is costly for property owners. Loon Lake's Lake Management District (LMD) assessment for the 2013 renewal totaled about \$69,500 per year for 5 years, devoted solely to milfoil treatment. Deer Lake's LMD current assessment totals about \$30,000 per year, so that's \$100,000 for both lakes. Loon Lake's LMD is up for renewal this year. Treatment costs and complexity continue to rise as hybridization of invasive Eurasian Milfoil and native milfoil is suspected at Loon Lake. One study in the Seattle area found a 19% decline in waterfront home values on lakes with Eurasian Milfoil infestations (Olden and Tamayo, 2014).

A recent discussion found that some people think when they are in the roundabout they should be polite by slowing down, letting the waiting cars pull out (like the way you would nicely exit a stadium parking lot). But, that's not the correct way to do it — you have to WAIT, because the cars in the roundabout have the right of way. The DOT says:

Slow down as you approach the roundabout, look to your left as you near the yield sign at the entrance to the roundabout. Yield to traffic already in the roundabout. Once you see a gap in traffic, enter the circle and proceed to your exit.

Use your turn signal to show waiting cars that you will be exiting.
